COMING SOON TO OUR TOWN: A COMPLETE SOLAR ECLIPSE



Dan Schneiderman, Eclipse Partnership Coordinator of the Rochester Museum and Science Center (RMSC), spoke at the PHHS January 8, 2024, presentation to discuss this major event. On **April 8, 2024**, the Rochester area—specifically the Greece Parma area—will be in the direct path of a total solar eclipse for the first time in almost a century. A total eclipse occurs when a portion of the Earth is engulfed in a shadow cast by the Moon which fully blocks sunlight.

Many people from outside the Greater Rochester Area are expected to come see this very rare event.

A record 116 people attended Dan's Parma Hilton Historical Society presentation at the Hilton Community Center.



Tales from the Collection

Stories of the lesser-known items in the PHHS Museum

Coffee grinder

Do you like a cup, or two, of fresh hot coffee in the morning? How about the smell of fresh brewed coffee? Or even, the smell of coffee beans being ground? Remember back in the day when your Mom would go to the IGA in town, and you, as a kid, would walk by the coffee aisle and they'd be grinding beans for your Dad's cup of coffee in the morning?

Now days you can either buy your beans at your favorite local supermarket and grind them there, or you could have one of the fancy new coffee makers that has an electric grinder built into the coffee maker. In earlier times there were smaller, generally one cup hand cranked grinders that you could have in the kitchen.

Coffee drinking first came to Ethiopia and Yemen in the 15th Century, then to Italy in the

16th Century. It reached India in the mid-17th Century and the first coffee houses came to Western Europe by the late 17th Century. And coffee came to the New World with the first settlers. But the coffee grinder was not invented until 1799 by Richard Dearman, an English blacksmith. Before that, you had to pulverize the beans by whatever means you had available. There are many written accounts of soldiers in the Civil War using the butts of their rifles to grind up the beans.

This backstory brings us to the tale of another of our sometimes-unseen pieces in our Historical Society collection, In the General Store display room, is an Enterprise coffee grinder, with a patent date of 1889. This one was made by the Enterprise Manufacturing Company, founded in Philadelphia in 1864, one of the leading makers of both large and small coffee grinders. Enterprise made heavy-duty grinders for grocers, retailers, and wholesalers. The one we have here is a Number 3, and River Rat Antiques says that this would be considered a medium sized machine. Of course, being from the 19th century, it is a hand cranked model. This one was donated to your Historical Society by Beth Platt many years ago and is in very nice shape.

This one has been on display for many years and is unused. After some prodding last year by board member and docent, Frank Hubbell, I got it into working condition, which turned out to be an easy task, thanks to WD40. Frank supplied our first bag of beans, and it was a big hit with kids who came through the museum, either with their parents or with one of the school tours we host. It makes another nice interactive piece we can let kids (or parents) use when visiting the museum. I was quite surprised to see just how fine the beans can be ground.

So, the next time you come to visit the PHHS museum, be sure to stop in the General Store and grind some coffee beans.


