Monday, March 11 "The Underground Railroad"

7pm Ingham Room, Hilton Community Center

Our presenter will be **Jerry Bennett**, an enthusiast and speaker on the history of slavery and the Underground Railroad in New York State.

Parma has several connections to the Underground Railroad including several historic houses that were stops on the way to Canada for former enslaved people.

Most recently, in October 2023 members of the Vond family, the first African American family to settle in Parma, came to Hilton Beach to take part in the dedication of an historical marker to honor their ancestor, Walter Vond. Walter was a fisherman who ferried many former enslaved people in his fishing boat to Canadian ships out in Lake Ontario. The ships then took the former enslaved people on to St. Catherines, Canada, and freedom.

Lesser known items in the Collection Who doesn't like ice cream?

In our General Store display, sitting next to our antique coffee grinder I told you about last month, sits a White Mountain Freezer 2-quart ice cream maker. According to Wikipedia, The White Mountain Freezer Company was started in 1872, in Laconia, New Hampshire, by Mr. Thomas Sands. In 1881, the company moved to Nashua, New Hampshire after a fire destroyed the factory in Laconia. In 1963, the company was sold to the Alaska Freezer Company of Winchendon, Mass, and then in 1974 the company was purchased by an investor group and renamed back to White Mountain Freezer, Inc. It is now part of Sunbeam, which is part of Newell Brands.

The first-hand cranked ice cream maker was patented in 1843 by Nancy Johnson and the first machine was produced in 1848 by William Young as the "Johnson Patent Ice Cream Freezer." Ice cream was served in the U.S. Back in Colonial times, it was difficult to make, until Nancy Johnson perfected and patented her design. For those interested, the first known thing resembling ice cream was made in China in the Tang period of 618 to 907 and was more like what we know as yogurt. The first "real" ice cream was known as Booza, and was made in Greater Syria in the 1500's. Ice cream is typically made by combining milk, cream, sugar, and flavorings such as vanilla or fruit, and then freezing the mixture while simultaneously churning it to incorporate air. This creates the smooth and creamy texture that is characteristic of ice cream. Then go ahead and crank for about 20 minutes or until it is very hard to crank.

The White Mountain Freezer's exterior is wood, the crank mechanism is nickel plated steel, and in decent condition for its age. It still cranks, though we haven't tried to use it.

So, the next time you visit the Parma Hilton Historical Society Museum, be sure to check out the White Mountain Freezer. Then go to your favorite ice cream shoppe (I like Abbott's) and have a cone.


